### Message from the Board Chair

The Global Ocean Treaty looks to protect 30% of the oceans deep-sea environment, which is a step towards a functionable future, as it's the minimum amount that must be protected to help the oceans survive, to help many species survive and to help our own human survival. The oceans are the lungs of Mother Earth and we must keep them functioning.

We have seen a government moratorium on deep-sea mining, and now that Canada has signed the treaty we must persuade Canada to take further steps and now ratify the treaty locally into law, to act as a leader to the international community and influence other countries to do the same.

As elections draw near in both Canada and the United States, it's crucial that we see our communities and future generations proactively protected from the forest fires, floods, droughts and many more climate disasters to come. We need to see this action now and we need leaders that prioritize water, food security, the Earth, and our families.

For decades destructive industries have had way too much jurisdiction and control within government and they disregard our democracy along the way. We must see immediate transitions to industry practices that will heal not contaminate, industry practices that balance a neverending lust for profit with a lust for life.

At Greenpeace, we are advocates for non-violent direct action; we uphold solutions to create positive change. We are not passive, we continue the fight, we uphold values that encourage change — change to the systems that hinder progress, change to systems that disregard life and lives.

Our work, our messages, and the impact of our actions are rooted in truth and fundamental rights. Let us strengthen our communities and reinforce unity and collective action. We move forward together.

# **OUR PROGRAM IMPACTS**

In 2023, the world faced a climate crisis of unprecedented scale. The year was marked by record-breaking global temperatures, and the impact on Canadian communities – in particular, Indigenous communities – was profound. Canada experienced its most devastating wildfire season, which led to mass evacuations, including the entire population of Yellowknife, and the resulting emissions far exceeded the country's emissions from the previous vear.

Amidst the chaos of this crisis, the fossil fuel industry – the main contributor to the climate crisis – has continued to profit, influence decision-makers and hinder progress towards climate action. And yet, because of your support, Greenpeace stood firm, advocating for a just transition away from fossil fuels and holding polluters accountable for their actions.

Your support allowed Greenpeace to achieve significant victories in 2023, including the historic establishment of a Global Ocean Treaty, a commitment to a moratorium on deep-sea mining by the Canadian government, and the prevention of a major oil spill from the FSO Safer, a decaying supertanker used as an oil storage and offloading vessel in the Red Sea. Closer to home, you helped to expose the influence of the fossil fuel industry in politics, allowed us to raise our voice at COP28, and drew attention to the destructive practices of the Canadian logging company, Paper Excellence. In doing so, we highlighted the ongoing struggle for real climate action, nature protection and strong environmental laws.

The need for Greenpeace is more crucial than ever. It's imperative that governments and industries are held accountable for fueling

the climate crisis and harming communities and species along the way, and expedite the transition from fossil fuels to renewable energy immediately. What's more, we're finding that again and again, corporations are lobbying governments to prevent effective environmental regulations from being passed.

Unfortunately, we're running out of time, and we need strong climate action and reparations – payments from the industries and governments who have invested in and profited from the harmful extractivism, to the communities that have been devastated by the climate crisis - to roll out within this decade. This won't come to pass without public pressure, and that's where Greenpeace comes in. We're independent from corporations and governments because of your support, and because of this, we've become a leader in the movement.

The road ahead to a greener and more peaceful world is long, but step-by-step we're on our way. Here at Greenpeace, those next steps will include making polluting and naturedestroying corporations pay for the harm they cause, calling out Canada's big banks for profiting from the climate crisis, and pushing governments in Canada and internationally to pass laws to protect the planet and uphold justice.

You are an integral part of this work, and you power us in more ways than one. Knowing that we're backed by hard-earned donations from people who care motivates us to push harder and demand more from those in power. Every Greenpeace achievement belongs to you, and we look forward to making even more progress for the planet together.

# **ENERGY TRANSITION**

### PUBLISHED THE **GREENWASHING** BIG OIL & GAS: THE FOSSIL FUEL **DECEPTION PLAYBOOK**



Fossil fuel companies are responsible for the climate crisis and continue to make a profit from it and pass along dividends to financers like Canada's big banks. To keep the profits flowing, they use their wealth and influence to halt and delay climate action, and shield themselves from responsibility for the harm they cause, all while greenwashing their activities and deflecting responsibility for the climate crisis onto others – such as the general public.

Our top priority is making polluters pay. With the help of our supporters, we're using research, media know-how and actions to hold fossil fuel corporations in Canada and globally accountable for climate change. In short, we're working to force fossil fuel companies to stop drilling, start compensating the people and communities harmed by climate change, and make greater strides toward a sustainable energy transition.

### Here's some of the progress we made in 2023:

- We investigated and exposed the lobbying and influence of fossil fuel companies. We published factsheets on the "Undue Influence" of fossil fuel company lobbying and we launched the "End Fossil Power" research webpage providing up-to-date information on industry lobbying. These materials exposed the industry's flawed actions and were used for media, social media and political campaigning.
- We empowered activists to identify and respond to misleading claims from the fossil fuel industry by creating a "Greenwashing guide" with our friends at the Canadian Association of Physicians for the Environment (CAPE).

#### **OUR CAMPAIGNS**

- We successfully fostered public calls for fossil fuel companies to be held accountable for climate disasters, identified potential legal options to support Indigenous and other frontline communities, launched a "Hold big polluters accountable for climate disasters" petition, and developed strong engagement on social media.
- On the eve of the climate negotiations (COP28) we rented a firetruck and projected a wildfire scene with a message "Make Polluters Pay," on the outside of the **Environment and Climate Change Minister** Steven Guilbeault's office. To make the message clear, we also submitted our "Tell Canada to be a climate leader at COP28" petition to Minister Guilbeault and Minister Freeland. The petition empowered supporters to speak out against industry lobbying the government and gained 8K signatures from supporters.
- We intervened in legal proceedings related to climate justice issues, that pushed for fossil fuel companies and governments to be

held accountable. Such as the Mathur et al. v. Ontario case, which argues that Ontario's decision to revise downwards its emissions reduction target violates Canada's Charter of **Rights and Freedoms.**

# FOSSIL FUEL DIVESTMENT




The five major Canadian banks – RBC, CIBC, BMO, TD, and Scotiabank – are among the top 20 global banks financing fossil fuels. By funding fossil fuel projects, they're not only responsible for fueling the climate crisis but also culpable of violating Indigenous rights and extending Canada's history of colonialism for short-term profits.

We've been working hard to expose how Canadian banks profit from climate change. Whenever we can, we amplify the voices of Indigenous communities harmed by financial institutions and call for banks to divest from fossil fuels and respect their rights. And, to secure the change we need, we've been campaigning with supporters like you to pressure the federal government to lay down new laws and regulations to make it illegal for banks to profit from climate change.

### Here's what some of that work looked like in 2023:

- We know our work to expose the role of the banks in climate change is working because major banks have upped their efforts to greenwash themselves in 2023. For example, rather than divesting from fossil fuels in 2023, RBC created the Climate Action Institute to "bring together economists, policy analysts and business strategists to help research and advance ideas to contribute to Canada's climate progress."
- Thanks to our efforts, we've seen a shift in how the media covers Canadian banks' responsibility for the climate crisis. Media stories increasingly focus on the need for banks to reduce their support for fossil fuel companies.

- We attracted new activists to volunteer with Greenpeace and provided them with training in campaigning and civil disobedience.
- In response to campaigning by Greenpeace and others, a Senator introduced the Climate Aligned Finance Act (Bill S-243) in 2023 to regulate what banks can support in light of climate change.
- Greenpeace supporters encouraged federal MPs to support the idea of a law to regulate banks. The number of MPs publicly supporting the need for a law to regulate the banks on climate rose from 20 to 64.
- We took action to confront the leadership of the Big Banks on their role in climate change. Greenpeace activists interrupted a climate leadership conference hosted by the BMO with banners that read, "BMO, what about your \$180 billion in fossil fuels?" BMO is one of the five big Canadian banks that invest heavily in fossil fuels and was ranked the 15th largest funder in the world between 2016 and 2022.

# **NATURE PROTECTION**




Forests help stabilize the climate, sustain a diversity of life, provide economic opportunity and are the source of culture for many Indigenous Peoples. Canada is fortunate to have some of the world's most magnificent and globally valuable forests. However, here in Canada and around the world, large areas of forests are being destroyed because of unsustainable industrial activities. This is why we've been exposing the corporate exploitation of these life-giving forests, calling out government inaction to protect nature, and amplifying the need to respect Indigenous rights.

### Here's what some of that work looked like in 2023:

- We continued to campaign for the federal government to pass a new law to protect nature before the next federal election. We did this by continuing to draw media attention to the need for such a law and mobilizing Greenpeace supporters to pressure the federal government to deliver on a promise to pass such a law.
- We investigated and exposed the harmful practices of Paper Excellence (PE), a Canadian forest company with links to Asia Pulp & Paper and the Sinar Mas group, which are destroying forests and biodiversity in Indonesia.
- We filed a complaint with the Forest Stewardship Council, demanding they acknowledge PE's connection to Asia Pulp & Paper, a globally notorious logging empire linked to deforestation and human rights violations.

- We mobilized Canadians to support the legal summons of PE's owner to testify to a Parliamentary Committee investigating their takeover of Canadian logging operations. He refused, but this generated widespread media attention.
- We launched a "Save the bees" petition asking Minister Guilbeault to protect our pollinators and our food systems. It gained over 28K signatures from supporters, speaking to the concern Canadians have for the lack of nature protection.
- We challenged the commodification of nature and deceptive offset programs including Shell's "Drive Carbon Neutral" program which we helped to shut down in the media and advocated for people- and planet-centered nature protections.

# **HEALTHY OCEANS**




Life on our blue planet depends on healthy oceans. The oceans are home to millions of aweinspiring creatures and are significantly relied upon by millions of coastal peoples in Canada and beyond. However, marine life populations are declining dramatically and are facing mass extinction. This is due to the climate crisis, industrial marine practices such as deep-sea mining, and a range of devastating levels of pollution, including plastic pollution.

We've been working hard to push the Canadian government to expedite ocean protection and ignore the pressure from big corporations who are lobbying them to continue pumping out plastic, all while challenging the public opinion on single-use plastics and promoting reuse systems.

### Here's what some of that work looked like in 2023:

- After over two decades of campaigning, we secured a historic environmental victory: a Global Ocean Treaty – a global agreement to protect 30% of the world's oceans by 2030 with marine sanctuaries - which will allow the oceans to recover and thrive.
- Despite agreeing to the treaty, the Canadian government delayed ratifying it. We called them out on this and pushed them to ratify and implement ocean protection in Canada immediately.
- We succeeded in persuading the federal government to support a deep-sea mining moratorium (DSM) just prior to international negotiations on future deep-sea mining. We did this by taking action and mobilizing Greenpeace supporters.

(Cont.) Notably:

- We set up a giant glowing octopus in Ottawa to ask Foreign Affairs Minister Joly to support a DSM moratorium, which grabbed the attention of the government and the media.
- Greenpeace activists projected two animated videos that told the story of deep-sea creatures facing giant, tanklike mining machines plundering their homes. The videos highlighted the risks and shared Greenpeace Canada's DSM petition, which calls on Canada to support a DSM moratorium at the International Seabed Authority meeting in 2023.
- The "Stop Deep-Sea Mining" petition gained 21K signatures, demonstrating a strong public front against DSM.

- We lobbied the federal government to expand the current single-use plastic ban. The federal court ruled against the listing of plastic items under environmental law, the federal government promised to appeal the ruling, and the ban is currently on hold until the appeal case is heard.
- To keep the pressure on we've issued a statement on the single-use plastic ban and received support from Minister Guilbeault on social media.
- We collaborated with a global team to draft a proposal to present at the Global Plastic Treaty negotiations in Ottawa, in 2024, where we hope Canada agrees to reduce plastic production and develop a strong treaty.

# LOOKING AHEAD

We are in the midst of the climate crisis, and it's only going to get worse unless we act now. Greenpeace Canada emphasizes this urgency in everything we do. It's time for big corporations and governments to be held accountable for their destructive, extractive practices and take climate action seriously.

To keep them on track, we will continue to push for a swift transition from fossil fuels to renewable energy, demand big polluters provide restitution for the communities that have been most affected by the climate crisis, and ensure governments — here in Canada and beyond — honour their commitments to protect 30% of the world's oceans as well as 30% of Canada's land and water by 2030. And as always, we'll ensure that the voices of scientists, Indigenous communities and those on the frontlines are not only heard but that the climate action we propose centralizes around the concerns of these communities.

Closer to home, we'll ensure the Canadian government fulfills its promises to strengthen biodiversity laws and ratify the DSM moratorium. We will also continue to encourage them to adopt a strong Global Plastics Treaty at the United Nations negotiations and introduce a new and effective nature law at the UN Convention of Biodiversity in 2024. We'll also maintain our pressure on Canada's top five big banks until they divest from fossil fuels and stop bankrolling the climate crisis.

With the upcoming elections, environmental protection, climate action, and social justice must be at the forefront of the public's minds and all those running for office. You can rest assured that we'll be acting as a megaphone and supporter for the planet, an amplifier and an ally for all who are demanding climate action.



### **A Reflection: Greenpeace Canada's Three-Year** Plan (2021-2023)



The end of 2023 also brought Greenpeace Canada's Three-Year Plan (2021-2023) to a close. And in doing so, it's important to take a moment to reflect on the progress and successes of the plan, and where that leaves us as we move forward.

The last three years were a period of significant growth, learning, and a commitment to aligning operations with core values for Greenpeace Canada. And I'm proud to say that we stuck to the (three-year) plan. We focused on centering intersectionality in all of our work, re-envisioning mobilization during the pandemic, and then rebuilding the momentum around our in-person organizing when it was safer to do so. We emphasized internal development throughout all of our departments, focusing on inclusivity, staff support, and living our values both within our organization and in the work we do in the outside world. A big part of this also included boosting transparency, efficiency and ensuring all staff can call themselves "tech-savvy." And last but not least – due to the pandemic and the financial crisis we're feeling around the world – we've been working hard to achieve a strong financial recovery.

In full transparency, we have not achieved all of the goals we set out for ourselves – especially as many of these goals are ever-evolving, and so is the context in which we are working – but we have made significant progress that we can be proud of.

Within this period, Greenpeace Canada's commitment to justice and decolonization remained strong. Greenpeace staff participated in webinars and discussions focused on disability justice, queer and trans justice, and received Indigenous Cultural Safety training. We created the BIPOC Wellness Fund to acknowledge barriers and harms that Indigenous, Black and other racialized folks can face in our workplace and in society at large. We also started the Healing Justice Fund to support Indigenous activists leading the climate movement outside of Greenpeace.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, we understood the difficulties our supporters might be facing, and that financial donations would drop. We understood the need to be cautious and to protect the health and safety of our staff, supporters, and volunteers. And during this time-like many other organizations and businesses - we increased our reliance on digital platforms as a way to connect with our supporters without gathering in person, which led to the strategic adoption of HubSpot. This involved training staff on a new platform, and increased authorship among our staff and volunteers, allowing more voices to be heard and stories to be shared.

As we now look to the next three-year plan — which is being finalized at the time of my writing this – we will continue to prioritize our decolonization work, allyship with Indigenous communities and we will continue to center environmental justice. And as always, we will remain committed to environmental issues both in Canada and globally – and in doing so – together, we will create a greener, more equitable world for all.

I look forward to updating you on our next three-year plan, and I'm so grateful for your joining us on this journey.

Diego is also interested in sustainable forestry, creative writing and sailing.

Ginger Gosnell-Myers, of Nisga'a and Kwakw<u>aka</u>'wakw heritage, has been exploring and working in urban Indigenous communities for over 20 years. She is currently the Morris J. Wosk Centre for Dialogue's Indigenous Fellow at Simon Fraser University (SFU), with a focus on Decolonization and urban Indigenous Planning, where she will explore the opportunities for Indigenous selfdetermination through urban planning projects. Ginger was the City of Vancouver's first Indigenous Relations Manager, where she was central to advancing Vancouver as the world's first City of Reconciliation and ensured that Indigenous recognition and meaningful inclusion was reflected throughout all City departments and plans. Ginger was a lead on the Environics Urban Aboriginal Peoples Study, Canada's largest research study on Indigenous people's living in urban centers. She has delivered a TEDx Talk - Canadian Shame: A history of Residential Schools, and a Walrus Talk - Who do you think we are. Ginger became Chair of the Board in February 2023.
