



A few months into the year, each day brings headlines reminding us of heatwaves, record-breaking temperatures, and water scarcity in various parts of the country.

For small kids, this means less time outdoors to play, the young plants need help to grow to their full potential, and the middle class and richer communities can still buy potable water but the poor, as with most crises, have a tougher challenge. Climate justice is at the heart of climate campaigns, we cannot just depend on technical fixes but need a holistic systemic approach.

The climate crisis has aggravated the extreme weather events - a long-forewarned catastrophe scientists have been alerting us to for decades is at our doorsteps. As a climate campaigning organisation, we recognise the urgency and the world's potential to do better. We cannot despair but act; our small and big individual lifestyle change is important and at the same time governments and big companies across the world need to step up and take bold action.

The year began for Greenpeace with the public launch of its newest regional office; in South Asia South Asia as a region has not been a major historical contributor to emissions but has been at the receiving end of climate events. The richer countries that have historically contributed to greenhouse emissions need to do more. South Asia is home to nearly 32% of the global poor. Significant populations here are dependent on natural weather systems for agriculture and fishing; making the vast

majority vulnerable to extreme weather events and other climate-related changes.



Greenpeace South Asia is here to be a part of the collective voice, action and resilience of climate justice movements.

At the city level, we see legislative changes that promote equitable public transport in Delhi and Bengaluru. In Bengaluru, 1,334 new electric buses will be added to the bus fleet. The Delhi government has also announced free bus travel for the trans community. This is a victory for all marginalised communities who face exclusion in our urban spaces.

As we persist in our campaign for climate justice and sustainable transportation in India, we express deep gratitude to our community of supporters and donors. Your unwavering belief in our mission fuels our journey towards climate justice, enabling us to enact meaningful change.

BENGALURU'S BUS SYSTEM GETS AN UPGRADE

In the latest Budget update from the Karnataka government, Bengaluru will see 1,334 new electric buses added to the bus fleet. This addition will help tackle the endless traffic jams and is a step towards meeting the transportation needs of the bustling city. While this is an achievement, this addition is not enough. The city needs at least 14,000 buses to meet the demands.



WHAT DOES DELHI'S BUDGET, HAVE FOR BUS USERS?

Delhi's budget for public transportation is ₹5,702 crore, down ₹200 crore from last year.

By 2025, approximately 2,500 buses will be added to the fleet. This still falls short of the 15,000 buses that the city needs.





₹340 crore is allocated for the pink ticket scheme, benefiting 11 lakh women..


2,080 mohalla buses will be procured, supporting first and last-mile connectivity.

It was a fitting closing ceremony highlighting the plight of the vulnerable population and reinvigorating the crowd through the power of music.

Through captivating presentations, immersive storytelling, and interactive sessions, the myriad threats facing our oceans and discussed practical, actionable steps everyone can take to contribute to ocean conservation were explored.

FEBRUARY 2024: HOTTEST MONTH IN RECORD

2024's February was the hottest February ever recorded. It was the same for January for the last seven months in 2023. The world is continuously breaking records and this is just the beginning. The world is heating up and we must act soon.

The temperatures are rising at a faster rate than ever before. The gaps between the record temperatures set in 2023 and 2024 and the old records from previous years which were broken are considerably wide, showing that the temperature rise is rapid.



NEW DELHI RANKED THE MOST POLLUTED CAPITAL CITY IN THE 6TH ANNUAL WORLD AIR QUALITY REPORT

The 6th Annual World Air Quality Report finds New Delhi to be the most polluted capital city in the world, while India ranks as the third most polluted country globally in 2023, closing following neighbouring Bangladesh and Pakistan.

India continues to grapple with drastically poor air quality with PM2.5 concentrations exceeding the WHO annual guideline by more than 10 times. The report released by IQAir has also identified India's Begusarai as the most polluted metropolitan area of 2023 globally.

India is facing a worsening air quality crisis. This spike in pollution levels poses significant health risks to an estimated 1.36 billion people in the country.


